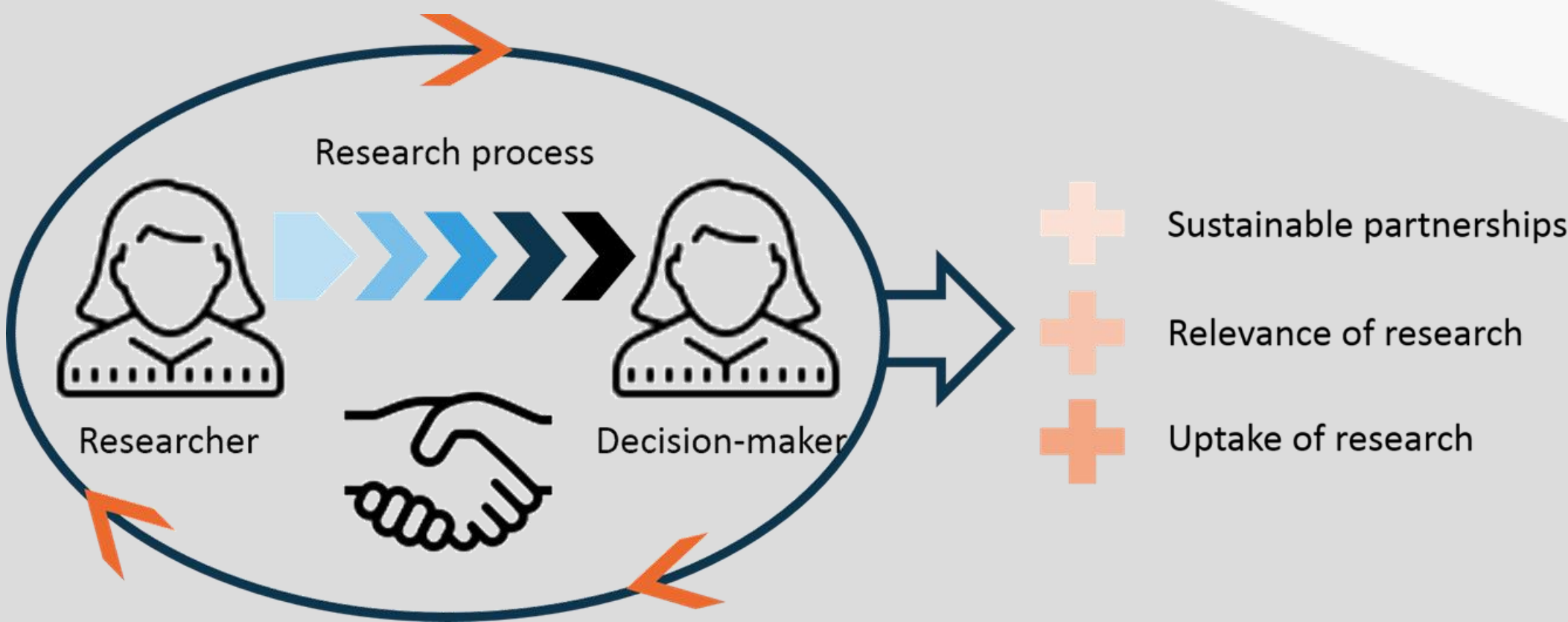

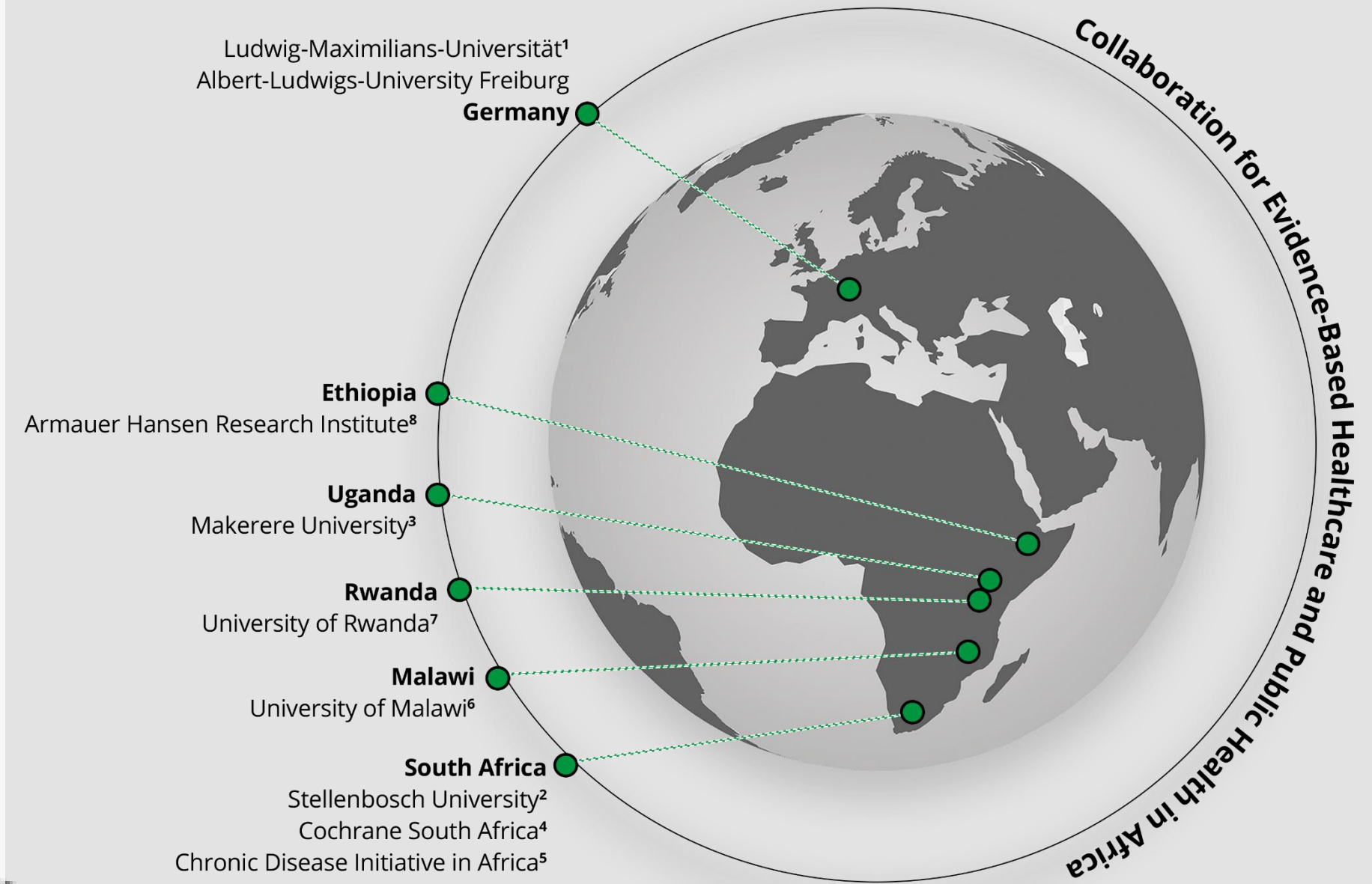
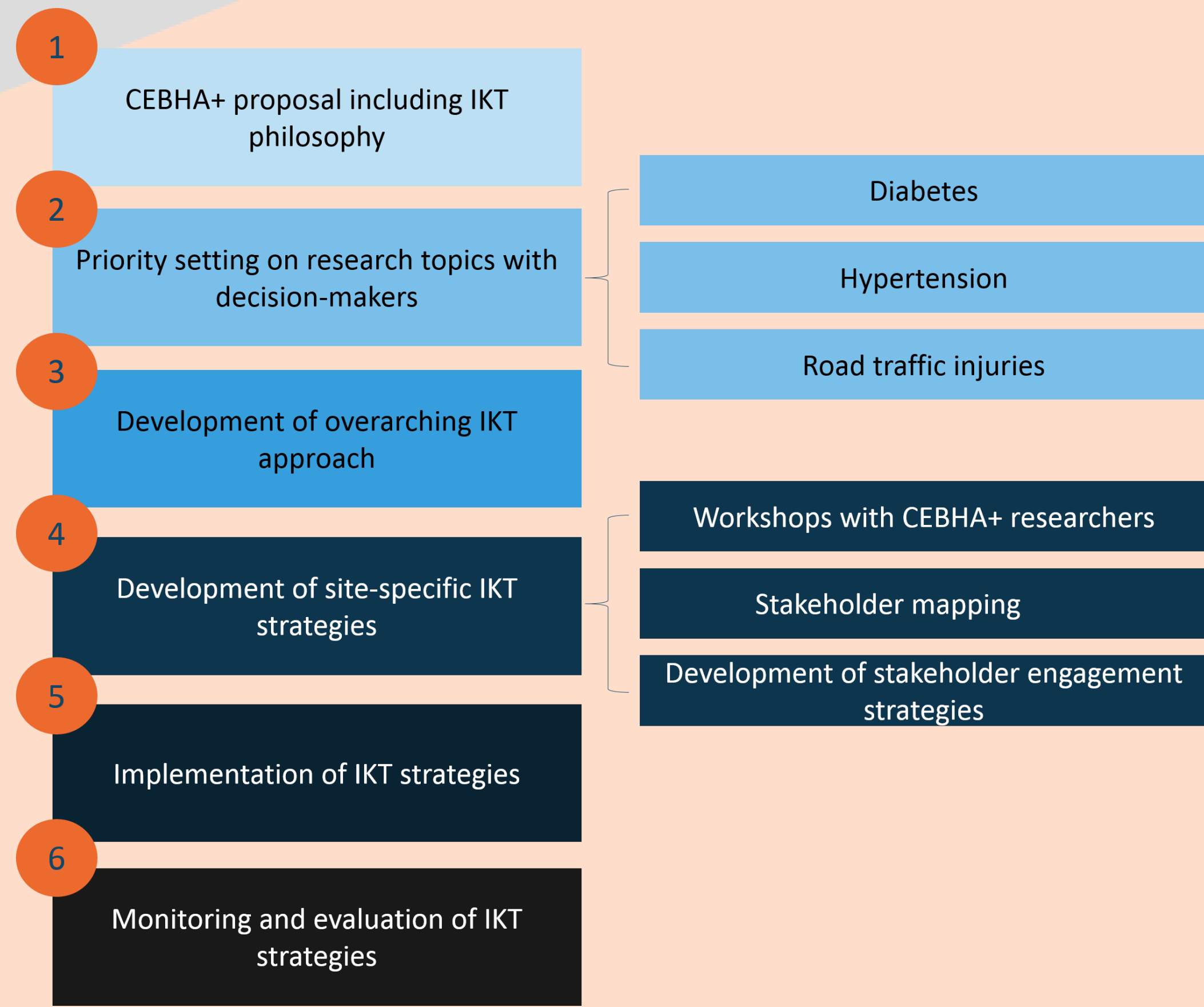
Integrated knowledge translation

Integrated knowledge translation (IKT) aims to establish mutually beneficial partnerships between researchers and decision-makers to increase the relevance and use of research for decision-making.



Integrated knowledge translation in CEBHA+

The Collaboration for Evidence-based Healthcare and Public Health in Africa (CEBHA+) aims to build long-term capacity and infrastructure in five Sub-Saharan countries by conducting research that is relevant and contextualized. This will be achieved through a coordinated IKT approach across countries with site-specific IKT strategies.
